Mission Funding in 2011

Through the Mission Giving of our 134 churches and the active involvement of their membership and pastoral leaders the Presbytery provides a witness to the saving grace of Jesus Christ throughout our region and abroad.

Pastoral Care and Development —Providing opportunities for pastoral leadership development, encouraging and supporting pastors in their ministry as well as candidates for ordination.

Missional Church —Creating an environment that is open to transformation and spiritual growth, to the development of innovative ministries, and to the support of immigrant congregations.

Learning — Christian education, stewardship training and lay leader development.

Mission & Outreach —Promoting mission initiatives in our churches, supporting hunger ministries, and developing mission partnerships throughout the region and abroad.

Funded Community Ministries include Chester Eastside, John Gloucester House and Kirkwood Camp. Social services such as Head Start Learning Tree and the Women’s Empowerment Initiative also receive Presbytery support in a variety of ways.



Your Giving Makes This Mission Happen!

Our Mission Funding in 2011 calls for resources totaling \$1,674,000. 70% of the funding for the 2011 budget comes directly from congregations in the form of mission giving and per capita apportionment. (The remaining 30% comes from investment income and designated funds.)

1. Congregational Ministry
\$320,000 (19% of the Budget)

Our Congregational Ministry Teams are actively engaged in helping congregations to partner with each other to get involved in the ways that God is at work in our communities.



Supporting leadership training and team building initiatives.

Maintaining the Resource Center with access to books, periodicals, audio/visual material and online resources.

Participating with churches and fellowships that minister to immigrant communities in our region.

Providing a voice for small churches, social justice and peacemaking.

2. Congregational Outreach & Mission Partnerships
\$615,000 (37% of the Budget)



The Presbytery provides financial and administrative support to the community ministries in Philadelphia and Chester falling under the oversight of the **Presbyterian Community Ministries of the Delaware Valley**.

Chester Eastside Ministries (CEM), fulfilling an important mission in the City of Chester through food distribution, after school, summer camp, cultural arts programs, Bible study and worship. *Presbytery funding to CEM will be \$132,000 in 2011.*

John Gloucester House (JGH), providing community food programs, after school and summer camp programs, and assistance for families in the Point Breeze neighborhood of South Philadelphia. *Presbytery funding to JGH will be \$100,000 in 2011.*

Head Start Learning Tree (HSLT) provides comprehensive education, nourishment, health and enrichment for 770 children and their families in 11 locations in disadvantaged neighborhoods of West and South Philadelphia.. *Support from the Presbytery budget involves the time and commitment of executive staff and administrative services.*

Kirkwood Camp, located in Stroudsburg, PA, offers a complete **Christ-centered camping** experience during the summer as well as retreat and conference facilities throughout the year. *Mission funding from Presbytery will be \$80,000 in 2011.*

Hunger ministry offers hunger education seminars at churches, and works with 21 care closets to provide food for families in need.

Women's Empowerment Initiative involves programs designed to strengthen communities and families through education and workforce development.

Mission Outreach commitments include disaster recovery work, partnership with Presbyterians in Zambia, and support of mission workers throughout the world.



3. Pastoral Ministry
\$200,000 (12% of the Budget)

The Presbytery is committed to the development of strong pastoral leadership.

The Committee on Ministry works with congregations and their pastors to promote an environment of effective communication, continual learning and leadership development.

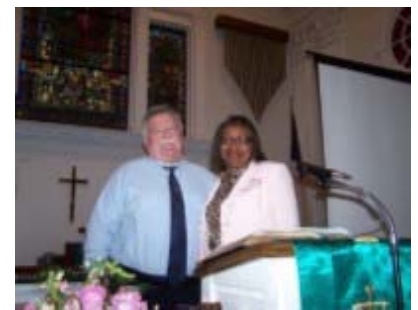


Our Associate for Care of Ministers provides pastoral care to the 365 active and retired ministers and their families in the Presbytery.

The Committee on Preparation for Ministry (CPM) counsels, supports and prepares our 47 inquirers and candidates for ministry as they seek to fulfill their calling.

4. Ecclesiastical Administration
\$327,000 (19.5% of the Budget)

The Presbytery fulfills essential ecclesiastical requirements of the PC (U.S.A), and is responsible to our congregations for the guidance, order, and discipline of ministry and worship.



The office of the Stated Clerk organizes and records all meetings of the Presbytery, and provides for attendance at meetings of the General Assembly and Synod.

5. Financial Management & Business Administration
\$212,000 (12.5% of the Budget)

Accounting and financial reporting, overseeing the process of stewardship and mission giving, and preparing the Mission Operating Budget. Administering banking and investment activity as well as all personnel, payroll and benefits requirements of all staff and program employees of the various ministries of the Presbytery.



***Maintaining all property and equipment of the Presbytery and all related insurance coverage on behalf of the Trustees of the Presbytery.**

***Supporting churches in property and financial matters, including capital campaigns, grants and loans, and lease or sale transactions.**

The work of the Presbytery is carried out by teams and committees drawn from among our minister members and members of congregations, as well as on-site program employees in specific ministries. It is supported by a core organization of 15 full-and part-time staff located at 915 East Gowen Avenue in Philadelphia.

Presbytery Resources for Mission

70% of Presbytery mission dollars come directly from our congregations, in the form of basic mission giving or per capita.

Additional Resources (outside the budget)

In addition to the annual budget, which reflects the work of the Presbytery in carrying out the *Missional Plan*, there are a number of projects and initiatives that require direct funding from specified funds, such as the Reserve for New Initiatives, the Scholarship Fund for Seminarians, the Capital Grants to Churches Fund, and the Covenant Fund.

Our Connectional Church at large

The **Synod of the Trinity**, which encompasses Pennsylvania, Southeastern Ohio, and most of West Virginia, has over 1,300 churches. Our financial support enables a small staff to engage in programs such as Partnership for Missional Church, church leadership development, grants for new church developments and church revitalization, campus ministries, racial-ethnic training, and disaster relief, and to coordinate communication and connectional activity among 16 member presbyteries.

The **General Assembly** is responsible to fulfill the mission, provide the services, and administer the policies and programs of our denomination. The Mission Budget of G.A. is established by the General Assembly Council in order to address matters of concern for the congregational, national and worldwide ministries of our church. Congregational Ministries provides resources and inspires congregations to strengthen their ministry of witness to Jesus Christ; National Ministries provides programs of discipleship – evangelism, social justice issues, women's ministries – throughout the U.S., and also provides grant funding for new church developments and church revitalization projects; and Worldwide Ministries supports mission personnel, develops global partnerships, and administers disaster relief and hunger programs. Per Capita apportionment giving provides funding for the Office of the General Assembly, which is responsible for the administration and staffing of the Stated Clerk's office and for managing the expenses associated with meetings of the General Assembly, as well as personnel, legal, communications, and budget activities. It also supports the Historical Society, and memberships and/or participation in national and international ecumenical groups. G.A. Special Offerings include One Great Hour of Sharing, Christmas and Peacemaking offerings.
